Fr. Kevin's Reflection

We are celebrating today the Fifth Sunday of Lent. Holy Week is fast approaching. I want to encourage everyone to make time for Jesus, the 33 young man, to speak to your heart over the next few weeks, especially through a good confession of your sin, in preparation for the coming feast of Easter. Although there are always many aspects of our parish life to address, these later weeks of the Lenten season offer us the opportunity to focus on what counts. And, what counts... the only thing that matters, is the salvation of our souls! The next few weeks, especially Holy Week - the only week in the year that is called "holy" - we should focus our attention on our relationship with the Lord, our sorrow and repentance for our sins, our desire for Heaven, and the salvation brought to us by Jesus Christ through His most merciful suffering, death, and resurrection. Traditionally, beginning today [the Fifth Sunday of Lent], we enter into what, before the days of Vatican II, was called Passiontide: a sort of "season within a season."

The "season" of Passiontide is no longer observed, but elements of the bygone days have remained. The penance and discipline of Lent change focus, a bit. The prayers, readings, and songs of the Mass now focus our attention on the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of Jesus ... The Paschal Mystery ... and the events leading up to this central mystery and belief of our faith as Catholic Christians. One of the most "noticeable" and dramatic changes that occurs, beginning this Fifth Sunday of Lent, is the observance of the custom of the veiling of the cross and images in our church. But, "... Why?" The veiling is done to remind us that the true beauty and meaning of the Cross, for a time, is hidden from our eyes. The "beauty" of the Cross is obscured and "veiled" by the suffering and blood of the passion... but, just "for a time!" The veiling also serves as a reminder to remove from our "sight" everything that keeps us from focusing on the passion of Christ. In 1988 the Congregation for Worship in Rome issued a document lauding the practice of restoring the practice of veiling crucifixes and images in the church.

The custom of veiling crosses and images has much to commend it in terms of religious psychology, because it helps us to concentrate on the great essentials of Christ's work of Redemption. Although this is true, the historical origin of this practice lies elsewhere. It probably derives from a custom, noted in Germany from the ninth century, of extending a large cloth before the altar from the beginning of Lent. This cloth, called the Hungertuch (hunger cloth), hid the altar entirely from the faithful during Lent and was not removed until during the reading of the Passion on Holy Wednesday at the words "the veil of the temple was rent in two."

The rule of limiting this veiling to Passiontide came later and does not appear until the 17th century. After the Vatican II there were moves to abolish all veiling of images, but the practice survived, although it has changed from previous custom. As we move toward Holy Week, and the celebration of the Lord's Passion and Death, more and more the Lenten purple is replaced by the red of the passion. A reminder of the Blood of Jesus. A red veil is placed on the cross to remind us that the true meaning, the real beauty of the Cross is (for a time) hidden or veiled from our eyes. The Glory of the Cross is stained and covered by the Blood of Christ's suffering. The practice of veiling the cross goes back many centuries and is meant to make us take a second look. It is meant to let us know that something is different. Just as the "veil" was removed from the eyes of the disciples at Easter, so too, the red veil [a symbol of the suffering and death of Jesus that "hides" from our eyes the real meaning of His Passion and Death — the true beauty and meaning of the Cross] will be removed when we come to Mass on Easter. As we approach the coming days of Holy Week when we celebrate the liturgies of the Lord's Paschal Mystery, enter into the true meaning of these holy days. Make the sacrifice of time and effort to join us for the beautiful liturgies of this Passion-time, and Holy Week. Together, let's take seriously the Church's invitation to focus our attention, devotion, and energy upon the celebration of this last full week of Lent and celebrations of Holy Week. Let's give the Lord our hearts, in the hope of His promise of Heaven. I hope to see all of you for the many devotions and services in the weeks ahead. Holy Week begins next Sunday with Palm Sunday. Plenty of time remains to make our plans, and make the effort to set aside the time to attend the Holy Week Services. Let's enter into these final days of Lent with mind and heart renewed, and our hearts resolved to grow closer to the Lord in love and devotion.
